

School Memories

In preparation for the Legacy Brunch, the Committee identified one person from each of the original schools to serve as a School Captain, helping to gather classmates and spread the word. The captains also answered interview questions about their experiences, such as **What do you remember** best about your school? What is important to know about it? And, how has your experience stayed with you during your life? Excerpts from their answers follow...

Elaine Ballerini St. Aedan School Class of 1965

When I think about my time at St. Aedan's, I remember that the academic challenges were balanced by rewarding extracurricular activities. Some of my favorites were choir and volleyball. But even more significantly, the best gifts from my time at St Aedan's are the lifelong friendships I made.

Anita Bellmore St. John the Baptist School Class of 1965

I remember best the sisters of the Congregation of Notre Dame. Most of them were very young, but they were very dedicated teachers. My education at St. John's was an extension of my religious training in my home. The school and the church were very connected within our neighborhood and families.

Gail Thibaudeau Bellucci St. John the Evangelist School Class of 1968

When I think about the fact that we were not children of great economic means, I am grateful for the rich educational experience we received at St. John the Evangelist. It was a different time, but forty children were in the classroom, and we learned! All of this was underpinned with experiences of faith: Friday walks to the church for Stations during Lent, Mass every morning before classes, and Sunday Mass as a school. Through my experience there, I find meaning in faith and a sense of community and a responsibility beyond myself.

George Cahill St. Peter School Class of 1964

My entire family (my parents, 2 aunts, 3 uncles, 3 brothers, and my sister) attended St. Peter School. In fact, I had the same teacher in second grade that my parents did. I remember especially our school Masses. All the grades were assigned their pews. I also remember that I enjoyed playing baseball for St. Peter's team. We were a very good team.

Don Deloge St. Francis School Class of 1955

My father was a graduate of St. Francis and both he and my mother were very active in the parish. Their connection to the church and school left a lasting impression on me. St. Francis School was the hub of neighborhood activity, and the school played a large role in fostering the Catholic tradition. A large majority of my classmates continued a Catholic education at either Notre Dame, St. Mary's, or Sacred Heart. Following my retirement, I became active in the school's development program and school board in a desire to help make the St. Francis experience a positive one for the current students.

Alder Anna Festa St. Michael School Class of 1981

I remember Sr. Mary Terese and her 12-string guitar. She was very athletic and so much fun to be around, not to mention a great teacher! I remember Mrs. Eastman and her great shoes, and my third grade teacher, Mrs. Longo, was always so loving and patient. Sr. Ludovica, the kindergarten teacher, was a treasure, especially in preparing for amazing graduations. Our school had a great sense of community and traditions. The memories that are built during those years stay with you as do the many friendships that develop.

Joanne Lenzi Fresco St. Patrick/Hamilton Street School Class of 1959

My parents had six children, all of whom attended Hamilton Street School. However, the school closed in the middle of my 8th grade year due to a fire. My class was able to finish the school year at the old Sacred Heart Academy on Greene Street in New Haven and we were the last graduating class of Hamilton Street School. I remember that for the upper grades the restrooms were in an outside building that didn't have any heat. If the weather was bad, you had to put on your coat to go use them!

Senator Martin Looney St. Rose of Lima School Class of 1962

I remember the painstaking and dedicated instruction of the Sisters of Mercy. They rigorously emphasized precise grammar and sentence structure to create effective writers. I owe the sisters a great deal in preparing me for high school, college, graduate school, and law school. I also cherish the sense of a stable community that we had. Most of the Class of 1962 had started first grade together in 1954!

Sr. Mariette Moan, ASCJ St. Brendan School Class of 1973

My eight years as a student at St. Brendan School were some of the best of my life! We were always encouraged to give our best to everything we did, no matter the outcome. During those years I witnessed my parents and many others working closely with the priests and sisters, and committed to the life of the parish and of the school. I was getting a first-hand lesson about how important it is to be of service and work together. I express gratitude to the memory of Fr. Joseph Dilion who was tireless in his energies to secure the future of St. Brendan School and committed to the communities of religious sisters who served there while he was pastor.

Clementina Mordecai St. Anthony School Class of 1965

I began at St. Anthony's in 4th grade when my family moved from Italy. It was very important for my parents to put me in a Catholic school, and we ended up at St. Anthony's because all the sisters there spoke Italian like my parents. I was taught English by Sr. Philomena. Moving from Italy to St. Anthony's was a beautiful experience of the universality of the Catholic Church. St. Anthony is like going home, and it has a special place in my heart. I am grateful to have met one of my lifelong best friends at St. Anthony's.

John Mordecai St. Mary School Class of 1962

I remember that I enjoyed going to school because I felt very supported there and special. The seeds of my faith were planted during my time at St. Mary's, and what I received there paid off later in life. At some point in my late 20s, I was looking for something... and I think I found the God of my youth. I was away from the church and then I came back. What was started as a child of God was always with me.

Bill O'Brien St. Boniface School Class of 1954

When I think about St. Boniface, there are lots of things I remember. I remember the nuns' Mass every day before school, two classes in a room, school uniforms, recess, and saying the Pledge of Allegiance and prayers. I went to school on a trolley my first year, and after that I was walked to school by a girl in the neighborhood. I wore heavy wool baseball uniforms with sponsors' names on the back: Bruce Oil Company, Chico's Bail Bonds, and Roessler's Yellow Tags. We also occasionally got to watch movies in the upstairs hall!

Suzanne Patry St. Louis School in New Haven Class of 1961

At the end of the day, my brothers and I and our friends would either walk or take a city bus to the Green downtown and wait by the three churches for a bus to West Haven where we lived. That early independence is one of my fondest memories of St. Louis School. The school was small, eight grades in only six classrooms. I met my late husband, John, in the 7th grade at St. Louis School! He transferred in from public school that year while I had been there since 1st grade. Our three children all later attended the school in West Haven.

Gerald Shea Sacred Heart School Class of 1961

Back then growing up, much of our lives involved the church and being active in the parish. We didn't realize it at the time, but the nuns were instilling in us the realization of the importance of education. I had six nuns and 2 lay teachers. I can remember almost all of the sisters' names. One of the lay teachers, Ms. Barbara O'Connor, taught my mother, her sister, and her brothers! I believe that my experience in Sacred Heart stayed with me my whole life.

Henrietta Szymolon St. Stanislaus School Class of 1961

From Kindergarten to 8th grade, St. Stanislaus School was the center of my life. We learned our subjects in English, but we learned our prayers and hymns in Polish and in Latin. It was a total immersion, a constant celebration of holidays, liturgical events, processions, and learning about our heritage. Not only did I get a complete education, I also got a lasting experience in faith and faith development. I also realized how much my parents invested in this education for me, how much it meant to them, and the sacrifices that they made.

Debbie Caruso Thorson St. Bernadette School Class of 1967

I vividly recall the sisters instilling in us that there are no "can't." They would say. "You are Americans, taught by Dominicans." My experiences at St. Bernadette and in Catholic education instilled the construction of moorings in faith. that grew deeper and rooted me in faith, hope, and charity. No matter how far I wandered, these moorings pulled me back to what is important in life and to the ongoing building of my relationship with God. No matter what life throws at you, these moorings in faith provide the stability to continue forward. No one can take away my faith and my education, and for this I am truly blessed and grateful.

Judge Robin Lynn Williams St. Martin de Porres School Class of 1974

My Catholic school experience has remained throughout my life. St. Martin de Porres imparted the Catholic faith to all the students. We were all a family, and the nuns paid great attention to the students to ensure that we were all learning and getting a good education. The discipline and structure that the nuns put in place prepared me well for high school, college, and law school, and carried throughout my professional legal career. I apply that same structure and discipline to this day as a Superior Court Judge.
